“Let the brothers and sisters keep the example of the most blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God and our Lord Jesus Christ, ever before their eyes. Let them do this according to the exhortation of Blessed Francis who held Holy Mary, Lady and Queen, in highest veneration, since she is “the virgin made church.” Let them also remember that the Immaculate Virgin Mary whose example they are to follow, called herself “the handmaid of the Lord” (Luke 1:28).” Rule, Chapter 4, #17

I had the pleasure of listening to Sandra Schneiders, IHM on December 3, 2016 in Holyoke, MA. She was speaking to LCWR members of Region 1. An important aspect of her sharing helped us appreciate “how great a dignity God has given us” (TOR Rule IV, 14) in Religious Life. I found that some of our own Franciscan ways of expressing our life readily lent themselves to her insights.

She characterized the Church’s pre-Vatican II image of Religious Life as a ‘state of life,’ a chemistry image, whereby we could appreciate its essence, water, for example, and its various forms, being solid, liquid, or gas. This allowed for many different ways of living the same values. However, using an image from biology, instead of chemistry, allows us to see Religious Life as an organism. A living being, “this form of life which is founded on the words and deeds of our Redeemer” (TOR Rule IV, 14) is, as Sandra Schneiders noted, an identity that perdures even through change; it interacts with its environment; it interacts out of its own center; and its interaction involves its own changes.

Religious Life is a 'life,' as our father Saint Francis knew, and all Franciscan religious, in any 'state of life,' any of the three Orders, are to emphasize this understanding. Our identity as Religious is not static, status, or state. Our identity is a life form, a living reality. Sandra Schneiders continued to look at Religious Life's nature: its perpetual and exclusive nature expressed in our vows. These vows are public and self-defining. We are responsible for living these ways. As our TOR Rule IV, #15 reminds us, "Professing chastity 'for the sake of the kingdom of heaven,' they are to care for the things of the Lord and 'they seek nothing else except to follow the will of God and to please God.' ... In all of their works the love of God and all people should shine forth" (TOR, IV, #15). Our integrity as Third Order Regular religious is "a special gift of grace to manifest in (our) lives that mystery by which the Church is joined to Christ her spouse" (TOR, IV, #16). Our identity involves a constant fidelity, a set of boundaries that keeps it alive and vibrant, a relationship rooted in our God who is always present, who lives with us.

How does the example of the blessed virgin Mary, the "virgin made church," lead us? If she "called herself 'the handmaid of the Lord,' what are we to call ourselves?

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel!

It is the liturgical season of Advent, a word that comes from the Latin, *advenire*, “to come to.” It is a time when we wait for Jesus *to come to us* through his birth as a human person. Christmas is the day when Jesus becomes *incarnate*, literally “into the flesh.” The divine God sends Jesus, God’s Divine Son, to us in a form like us in all things but sin. Jesus becomes human!

This tenet of our Christian faith reminds me of two stories. The first is about a little girl of about three years old. Her parents had put her to bed one night and returned to the living room. However, a few moments later, they heard their daughter call out to them, “Mommy...Daddy!” The note of fear in their daughter’s voice compelled both of them to respond to her. When they reached her room, her mommy asked her, “What’s wrong, Sweetie?” To this the little one replied, “I’m scared!” Puzzled, her daddy asked her what she was afraid of. The little girl replied, “I don’t know. I’m just scared.” Her mommy reassured her that she was safe because her mommy and daddy were just in the other room and they would protect her. Thinking they had reassured their little daughter of her safety, they turned to go to the living room; however, as they left their daughter said again, “But I’m really scared!” Her mommy thought she would pull out the “heavy duty armor” of this home security team

and said, “Really, honey, there’s no reason to be afraid. Jesus is with you and He will protect you always.” To this, the little girl said, “I know. I know Jesus is with me, but I need a Jesus with skin.”

Sometimes in our fears and anxieties, or our dashed hopes or difficult moments, we secretly wish someone would just come and take everything away and make life good again. Sometimes we need a “Jesus with skin;” an incarnate Jesus.

The second story comes from a text written by St. Francis. In Francis’ *Letter to the Faithful*, he attempts to instruct everyone about the goodness, mercy and love of God. He cites many passages from the Gospels and encourages everyone to follow the life of Jesus. However, he doesn’t just tell stories from Scripture; he gives examples of what this Gospel life is about by giving examples that ordinary people would understand. In the following passage, we see how Francis teaches all to be “a Jesus with skin” in the world within the context of one’s own life.

⁵¹We are spouses when the faithful soul is united by the Holy Spirit to our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁵²We are brothers, moreover, when we do *the will of His Father* Who is in heaven; ⁵³mothers when we carry Him in our heart and body through love and a pure and sincere conscience; and give Him birth through a holy activity, which must shine before others by example.

⁵⁴O how glorious and holy and great to have a Father in Heaven. LtF 51-54

Francis shows us that *we* are the bearers of Jesus into the world through our faithful espousal and commitment to our faith through the Holy Spirit. We are united as brothers and sisters with Jesus by God’s creation of us out of love. We are mothers when we *incarnate* Jesus into the world through our actions and words that reflect the presence of Jesus in the world. We, by our very nature, put skin on Jesus when we are faithful to our God, when we show care and compassion to all, and when we bring Jesus alive by our thoughts, words and actions.

During this season of Advent, we wait for the birth of Jesus. We are not waiting for the historical Jesus who was born of Mary so many years ago. We are not waiting to celebrate the memory of that birth. Rather, we are waiting in hope to find the way that God calls *us* to bring forth Jesus into a world that needs actions and signs of goodness, mercy, compassion, love, and hope. We “wait” by putting aside the holiday rush of celebrating Christmas in an historical or superficial way. We “wait” as we sit in the periodic silence and solitude of our lives to listen for the ways that we might bear Jesus into this world. We are “expectant” as we nurture the love and goodness within us and the ways in which we share of ourselves to bring Jesus with skin into the world.

I invite you to find those moments of silence and solitude to contemplate the

seeds of goodness and love within you that wait to be born, as you become part of that miracle of the Incarnation of Jesus into our lives! May this Advent season be filled with the warmth, love and wholeness that you will bear to the world.

2016 NATIONAL VIGIL TO PREVENT GUN VIOLENCE

This event was originally called **December Sabbath to Prevent Gun Violence**. Four years ago on December 12, 2012 20 children and 6 staff were killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut. They were gunned down by a young man who was mentally ill and got the guns from his mother's house. He also shot his mother and eventually himself. Every year since then an organization called Newtown Foundation, joined by other organizations, has initiated a vigil on this weekend to remember not only those killed at Sandy Hook but the 120,000 Americans killed by gun violence

throughout the United States and to pray for an end to gun violence.
Since the tragic Sandy Hook shooting:

- Over 400,000 Americans have been killed or injured by guns;
- Nearly 200 school shootings, according to Everytown for Gun Safety (<https://everytownresearch.org/school-shootings/>)
- There have been over 1400 mass shooting incidents (defined as four or more people shot in an incident), according to the Mass Shooting Tracker (<https://www.massshootingtracker.org/data>)
- There has been no congressional action to #EndGunViolence, with three failed gun violence prevention votes in the Senate and no votes in the House of Representatives.
